

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome to our first edition of news@pulteney for 2016.

Schools are bustling places, full of energy and life and the excitement of new discoveries and the potential of new ideas. You will find this edition of our regular magazine a genuine reflection of all of this curiosity, activity and engagement.

I have just recently read an article in Harvard Business Review by Erika Andersen, entitled "Learning to Learn", focusing on the necessity for companies and executives to "respond to big shifts" and develop a "willingness to experiment and become a novice again and again" in order to keep abreast of the pace of change. Andersen identifies four attributes that successful learners possess: aspiration, self-awareness, curiosity and vulnerability.

Upon further reading, I came to the conclusion that these four attributes are essential for any learner, no matter their age or situation, and they can be seen in our students and in our staff, on a daily basis. I see students who grapple with challenging concepts, assisted by their teachers to shift their response, to identify the benefits of problem solving rather than focusing on the initial roadblocks. I see students and staff exercising their self-awareness through objective assessment of their own progress and seeking feedback to help inform further growth.

Students are naturally curious. As Andersen states, they "are relentless in their urge to learn and master". At Pulteney we encourage the use of powerful questioning by students to fully explore issues and concepts and we promote language that fosters a growth mindset – a shift in the inner narrative from unsupportive self-talk, such as "I can't do this" to "I know I can learn to be better at this over time, with effort". In addition, when mastery is achieved, it is important for all of us to then identify our weaknesses in other areas and seek to continuously improve rather than remaining in a comfort zone whereby further learning is compromised.

Andersen asserts "the ability to acquire new skills and knowledge...is crucial to success in a world of rapid change". I would also add that an ability to find peace and mindful calm as well as nurturing a sense of fun in our daily lives and in our relationships are also crucial and our Wellbeing programs for students and staff certainly aim to facilitate these.

As we enter our Term 1 break, I thank everyone in our School community for a productive and exciting start to the year and I hope all have an opportunity for quality family time and refreshment in the coming two weeks.



I look forward to reclaiming the Winter Shield on 27 August!!



December 2015 White Water Kayaking – Eildon

Early December brought about the annual end of year Venture Club trip for senior students. A small, but keen group of paddlers set forth to Eildon, Victoria to sharpen their flat water skills on the vast Lake Eildon and experience the white water of the Goulburn River.

During the trip, the weather was kind, allowing the group to refine their technique on flat water and develop important rescue skills needed for white water action. Paddlers play an important role with on-water safety; all practiced 'T-rescues' to be efficient with this skill and a few accomplished the challenge of self rescue using the rolling technique.

Students made use of moving water on the Goulburn to edge, ferry-glide and catch eddies. The venue location, Eildon Caravan Park (Blue Gums), provided great facilities and fronted directly onto the river. Paddlers simply needed to exit the river at the end of a run and carry their kayak 500 metres upstream to do another run. The final afternoon was very

relaxed with students enjoying attempts to surf the standing wave and playing around in the inflatable boats.

Kurrajong

TERM 1 2016 Growth Mindset

In Kurrajong we are encouraging students to embrace challenges and learn from setbacks by approaching their work with an effective mindset, enabling them to embrace skills that will prepare them for lifelong learning. Growth mindset is based on the work and research of psychologist, Dr Carol Dweck, and it is our intention to foster this approach in children to challenge their thinking about their abilities and potential. Often students think that they are not good at a particular curriculum area and believe that they will not improve in that subject. Thinking in this way is called a 'fixed mindset'. This thinking can result in students'



refusal to take risks for fear of failure; students have a deep sense of self-doubt; they blame others or outside circumstances when things do not go their way; and are motivated by reward and praise from others.

During Kurrajong assemblies and throughout the classrooms each day, the teaching staff and myself have begun to educate the students firstly on how the brain works (how the brain has many parts that do all kinds of different jobs) and that we can help our brain to grow faster, be more powerful and grow stronger through learning new things. We spoke about our brain as if it were a muscle (even though it is an organ!) and that like muscles we need to continue

to exercise it and train it through repetition and practice. We showed the students the picture below of synaptic connections that are made when we learn new things and how when we continue to use and practice them our synaptic connections grow (neuroplasticity). The picture clearly shows that when we do stop learning and practicing different things, the synapses begin to prune and die.

At assemblies I have been reading the picture book titled 'Your Fantastic Elastic Brain – Stretch It, Shape It' by JoAnn Deak that reinforced the concepts mentioned above. I recommend it for families to purchase and read with your child at home.




I worked collaboratively with Year 2 teacher, Jude Prance and her students in 2P to delve deeper into the specific parts of the brain (see figure 1.1).

Students then created a model of these different areas of the brain, labelling how that part of the brain assists us in our daily lives.

Growth mindset thinking can result in students developing a love for learning and self-improvement; a desire to be challenged; a willingness to work for positive results; a belief that you can control the outcomes in your life with effort and practice; the ability to learn from mistakes and failures; emotional resilience; and being self-motivated. Here are a few helpful tips that we can all use to help our students/children develop a growth mindset:

- Praise carefully not for intelligence but for effort e.g. "I have noticed the effort you are putting into...."
- Encourage deliberate practice and targeted effort e.g. "All of your hard work and practice is resulting in progress in...."





- Encourage high challenge tasks to grow those brain cells
- Discuss errors and mistakes and help children to see them as opportunities to learn and improve e.g. "You made a mistake. That is ok, we all make mistakes when we are learning something new. What can you learn from it, to improve next time?"
- Teach children to talk back to their 'fixed mindset' internal voice with a 'growth mindset' internal voice

Below is a list that the staff are using to show students how to recognise fixed mindset thoughts and how to replace them with growth mindset thoughts.

INSTEAD OF	TRY THINKING
I'm not good at this	What am I missing?

The picture below depicts the Growth Mindset display outside the Kurrajong Office to remind students of the growth mindset thoughts for them to practise.



The final four take-away points of growth mindset are:

Effort: The more targeted effort you put in, the more you will get out.

Difficulty: Difficult and challenging tasks give opportunity for growth. Encourage children to push outside their comfort zone.

Mistakes: Help your child to see that mistakes are feedback (not failure) and it is how we learn and grow.

Yet: When you hear your child say, "I can't do it", rephrase and add "Yet". "You can't do it yet, is there anything I can do to help you?".

Growth mindset aligns with the school 'Learning and Performance Culture' where we foster personalised growth and development; seek and create ways to enhance student learning; foster a mindset of growth and resilience; and share insights, practices and research with our community. Staff worked in partnership with students and families to continue to use the language of growth mindset when developing students' learning goals during

Student Led Conferences in the latter part of Term 1.

TERM 1 2016 BUDDY PROGRAM ACROSS SUB-SCHOOLS

Across the Junior School each class has a buddy class. The buddy system helps to promote friendship and support between older and younger peers through regular collaboration between their classes, fostering a sense of whole school community. The benefits are twofold, the older children learn to take responsibility, while the younger children know that they have a

fellow student they can turn to for support. The following are a couple of examples of buddy classes in action:

Mr Johnson's Year 9 students have been working in partnership with RK students in Kurrajong to design and build interactive games. The Year 9 IT students each interviewed their Reception 'client' to establish favourite characters, colours, games they liked to play and ways the

younger students wanted to interact with their game. The Year 9s were then given three weeks to design and program a game in Scratch that used these elements, and come up with a new and innovative method for their 'client' to play their game.

The senior students then came back to Kurrajong for a Friday game day, where the Reception students could play their personalised game that had been developed as well as try out the other games available. It was

amazing how responsible and mature the Reception students were in their interviews, carefully explaining their hobbies and favourite things, and the Year

Prep School

Humanities and Social Science

The recent change to the Australian Curriculum has seen the Prep Staff review year level teaching programs to include the newly endorsed Humanities and Social Sciences curriculum.

The Humanities and Social Sciences are the study of human behaviour and interaction in social, cultural, environmental, economic and political contexts. They have a historical and contemporary focus. These sciences range across personal to global contexts, and they consider challenges for the future.

Subjects in this learning area include: Humanities and Social Sciences, History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business. These subjects are taught in the Prep School through an integrated studies approach. An integrated curriculum is one that transcends the boundaries imposed by traditional subject groupings. It allows students to move across disciplines as they learn about their world.

Through studying Humanities and Social Sciences we hope to encourage our Prep School students to develop their ability to question, think critically,

solve problems, communicate effectively, make decisions, and adapt to change. Thinking about and responding to issues requires an understanding of the key historical, geographical, political, economic and social factors involved, and how these different factors interrelate. Classroom teachers have focused on this in their planning of curriculum for the 2016 School year. The following sections explain the topics which were introduced at each Year level during Term 1.

Year 3

The Humanities and Social Sciences theme introduced in Year 3 was 'Australia - Past and Present'. The students and their teachers began their investigation into this topic by discussing the different ways in which families celebrate Australia Day. The classes next investigated the history of Australia Day before then studying the

emblems, symbols, flags, capital cities, icons, and national colours of Australia. Towards the end of the term the students were encouraged to trace their ancestors by looking at their family history. Some children even had the opportunity to create a 'family tree' which they thoroughly enjoyed sharing with their peers.

Year 4

The Year 4 Humanities and Social Science topic for Term 1 was 'Indigenous and Torres Strait Islanders before European Settlement'.

Excursions to the South
Australian Museum and the
Living Kaurna Cultural Centre at
Marion expanded the children's
knowledge of this topic
and provided the necessary
information to help them explore
this topic and build on their
research skills. The excursions

gave the students a strong 'visual understanding' of what they had been reading about and researching in class.

For their assessment task students wrote about 'A day in the life of an indigenous elder or an indigenous child'. They then recorded themselves on their iPads telling the story as this was how stories were shared in the years before European settlement. The children thoroughly enjoyed presenting their findings in this manner, and many students included pictures or art as slideshows in their recording.

Year 5

Throughout Term 1 the Year 5 students focused on the Australian colonial period during their Humanities and Social Science lessons. As a starting point classes began by investigating what it takes

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to set up a new community or settlement. This process involved exploring how to plan, and then establish, a successful 'classroom community'. From there, the students moved onto investigating online communities. This included considering how to keep safe and happy in an online environment. The classroom discussions that followed identified the expectations for the use of online tools and applications that the students will implement throughout the year.

Once this foundation was firmly in place classes commenced their investigation of early Australian communities. Excursions to the

State Library, the Migration Museum, and the Art Gallery, expanded the children's knowledge of this topic and assisted them to develop their knowledge of the issues faced by early settlers in colonial Australia. As they worked on completing their research the children showed a genuine interest in the lifestyles of the early settlers. For their final assessment task the students wrote a journal or letter about life in early colonial times as told from the perspective of a first colonist.

Year 6

The focus for Year 6 Humanities and Social Science lessons during the term was 'A Diverse and

Connected World'. The students began by choosing an Asian country to focus upon and then used their research skills to learn more about it. They then worked in pairs to compare the financial and geographical wealth of two Asian countries.

By integrating the Humanities and Social Sciences into the Prep School curriculum we aim to assist the children to develop a broad understanding of the world and to provide them with the guidelines and skills necessary to participate as active informed citizens in the 21st century.

DOCTOR FOR A DAY

After recess we made posters on various types of diseases and then did a case study to diagnose them according to the posters. Overall, the day was really fun and I learnt a lot. Doctor for a day made me much more interested in how the body works and I would definitely do it again."


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Community Relations

Karl Weidenhofer (1994)


Karl Weidenhofer's growing metal finishing business joined The Advertiser and Sunday Mail Jobs SA campaign.

He met his future wife there, Joy, was married and they had three children.

In the late 1960's he decided tailoring was too hard a game from which to make a living. He was offered a job by his brother John to work in one of his gift shops. This gathered greater financial security, Joy and Geoff both worked in the business until the late 1980's. In his later years, Geoff became a chauffeur driver, a job he found most enjoyable. He got to dress nicely and drive

expensive cars. He also loved to have a chat, meet important people like movie stars, politicians and businessmen. He became the personal driver for Robert Gerard. The job gave him a high level of self worth and respect.

At 70 Geoff retired and he and Joy travelled then to Asia, the UK and Europe several times and enjoyed life together. Geoff had many interests in life about which he was rather obsessive. He was either hot or cold or nothing. These interests included Footy. He loved the Pulteney Old Scholars Football Club as he was involved in heavily developing it for present and future Old Scholars. He also played over 300 games and in many Premierships until he was 38. He formed many great friendships and was honored by a Life Membership. Geoff also had a passion for the SANFL and was a mad Sturt fan and particularly enjoyed their Premiership years.

Geoff also loved the Trots, attending the Wayville Showgrounds either on Friday or Saturday nights. He loved fishing, with favorite spots being Rapid Bay and Moonta where he had two boats.

He also loved Netball where he did a lot of fundraising, growing fushias, horse racing, lollies and showbags at the Royal show.

Geoff died at the healthy age of 86 from a relatively short illness on Sunday 15 November 2015.

Christopher (Critter) Adams (2006)





Christopher attended Pulteney from 2002 until 2006 and was involved in a broad range of activites during his time at School. A solid although at times inattentive student, Christopher developed strong relationships with many of his peers and impressed staff as a self motivated, polite and honest student. A loyal member of Cawthorne-Nicholls House, Christopher's determination to do his best at all times was an inspiration to younger students.

After leaving School Christopher joined the Old Scholars Football Club where he applied himself with his customary vigour and dedication being rewarded by promotion to the A grade in only his second year and being bestowed the honour of Captaincy in later years. Christopher, or 'Critter' as he became known, epitomised the Navy Blue spirit as a hard but fair competitor on the field and a great mate after the game. His interest in his team mates and kindness toward them was genuine and reflected the warmth of his personality. Although only playing 95 games for the Old Scholars and managing a spectacular four goals in his illustrious career, his impact was far greater setting the standard with his fierce attack at the ball, courage and loyalty which held the back lines together on many occasions.

Critter lived with enthusiasm and a zest for life that was infectious and he was always the life of the party. His ability to connect with everyone he met was nowhere more evident than at the Football Club where everyone was made to feel like they were a special part of his life, from players through to Board members.

Tragically Christopher fell ill in January 2015 after being diagnosed with brain cancer and, while he fought the disease right up until his last breath, he was sadly taken away from us in November 2015, aged 26.

Critter will always be remembered for his smile, enthusiasm and kind, caring nature. He might have left us physically but will live forever as player number 19. The Pulteney Football Club have retired the number 19 Guernsey (once a Navy Blue, always a Navy Blue!).

John Griffiths (1954)





John was born on 18 November 1936, only child to Nesta and Roy Griffiths.

John grew up in Adelaide and attended Pulteney Grammar School where he enjoyed a wide range of activities including tennis and football.

During John's years at Pulteney he had a close group of friends he kept in contact with, these were Bruce Glastonbury, Geoff and Barry Harvey and Roger Daulby.

After finishing at Pulteney, John studied Accounting which led to his first job at Elders. John met Gwen and they married soon after they built their home at Hawthorndene and had two children Leanne and David.

After leaving Elders, John worked at Nonporite for many years before starting BIY in 1986. Although starting a business in the 1980's was difficult, it did not take long until John had a strong following and customer base. Long hours and 7 day working weeks just seemed normal.

John enjoyed writing letters especially to Politicians - State or Federal, Labour or Liberal, if there was an issue he would give them some advice.

John had a passion for his garden at Waikerie, this included growing beautiful roses and lilies to a wide range of vegetables. Weekly he would bring a selection of oranges, vegetables and flowers to the staff. The house always had beautiful flowers and he would not be happy unless all vases were full.

In the last five years John took a slight step back from his role at BIY and spent more time at Waikerie. He would still drive to Adelaide twice a week but was keen to return to his friends at Waikerie not long after he had arrived in the city.

John was a firm man in business and would always express his thoughts even though this could be taken sometimes the wrong way. Behind this strong man he had a loyal group of staff backing him all the way.

Early this year John spent a few days in hospital for a small illness and it was now time at 78 to take life easier. The days of driving to the city twice a week at 2.00am would have to be less, maybe one trip a month.

John loved his independence and freedom the country life gave him right until his last days.

John appreciated that his parents enabled him to attend Pulteney, his ties with the school, from being a member of the Old Scholars Committee, through to enjoying catching up with friends socially and at reunions and at Pulteney Balls.

He was also proud to be a Grandparent at the school.

Warwick Isherwood (1969)

Warwick was born in Melbourne, 1 April 1952, the second of three children of Len and Betty Isherwood.

From Horsham the family were transferred to Adelaide and Warwick did all of his schooling at Pulteney Grammar School and met his life-long friend Hugh Paterson. Although they had not lived in the same city since their school days, it never diminished their friendship.

At the end of Year 12 Warwick chose Law as his career. He did first year Law at Adelaide University and then transferred to Melbourne University as the family had by that stage moved back to Melbourne.

Warwick and Deborah met when they were both working at a small Law firm and in the time-honoured tradition Deborah married the boss, although they both had moved onto subsequent jobs by that stage. They had a wonderful 34 years together and had three children, Alan, Mark and Susan. The children were Warwick's greatest joy and proudest achievement.

Warwick's love of travel and photography made a wonderful fusion and Deborah spent many hours holding various assorted lenses and cameras whilst he decided which combination to use. Both Warwick and Deborah loved travelling in Europe, in particular through the countryside and had a number of holidays there, including a memorable "White Christmas" holiday with their three children.

Warwick was a solicitor for over 35 years and since 1 January 2006 he practised on his own behalf, through Warwick Isherwood and Associates Pty. Ltd. Prior to that time, he was a partner at two medium sized Law firms for over 20 years and in both of those firms he was the head of their respective IT and Telecommunications practices. Warwick was a very successful

Corporate Lawyer working in both major Government and Corporate projects.

Warwick had a natural affinity in teaching young solicitors entering the profession. He strongly believed in "stretching" their abilities, rather than giving them menial work and most of those solicitors appreciated his guidance and mentoring. He was very proud of the subsequent successes of those young solicitors and the friendships that developed therefrom.

Warwick was a member of POSA and very proud Pulteney Old Scholar and maintained contact with several of his teachers for many years after leaving school.

Warwick had patience, a genuine care for others, wisdom and dry sense of humour and his memory will live on among his friends and in particular, his family will always cherish the love he gave them.



Daryl Stevens (1960)

Daryl Joined Pulteney in February 1955 in 5A with Miss L M Moore as his class teacher. He enjoyed his time at Pulteney until he left to join the Royal Australian Navy in 1961 where he served for 12 years. He served aboard the Daring Class destroyer HMAS Duchess in May 1964 as part of the ship's naval stores team. The Destroyer joined the Far East Strategic Reserve during the Indonesian/Malaysian Confrontation. His second tour of duty with HMAS Duchess came as escort for HMAS Sydney, carrying the first combat troops to

Vietnam. Daryl also served on the destroyer tender HMAS Stalwart, and aboard HMAS Tarangau on Manus Island in New Guinea. From 1967-1973 Daryl was posted to Fleet Staff at Garden Island in Sydney, as part of the Supply Operations Assistance Team.

Following his discharge from the Royal Australian Navy Daryl worked in supply and personnel fields for James Hardie in South Australia and Coles/Myer in Western Australia.

Daryl was a founding member of the Friends of the

South Australian Maritime Museum in Sydney and a member of the National Film and Sound Archive Screensound Australia in Canberra. He was also a member of the HMAS Sydney and Vietnam Logistics Veterans Association (Vic) and was heavily involved with the St John Ambulance Service in South Australia.

Daryl was a keen supporter of Pulteney and in particular the War Memorial Room. He donated many items to enhance the collection – and to ensure the Navy was well represented!

Nicholas Ruygrok attended Pulteney from 2002 until 2007, immersing himself in all the School had to offer during that time. Nicholas was a strong student, maintaining a high standard of achievement

academically and also in cocurricular activities of which there were many. Nicholas represented the School in Cricket, Pedal Prix, Tournament of the Minds and Football and was an accomplished School Rower, integral to the senior squad in his latter years and rising to be Captain of Rowing in 2007. Nicholas was elected by his peers to Vice President of the Forum in Year 12, was a House leader for Bleby-Howard, President of the Venture Club and achieved a Gold award in the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme.

After leaving School, Nick set on the path to realize his political ambitions, graduating in Law from Adelaide University where he met future fiancée, Verity Zoerner, the pair moving to Sydney together in 2015 to pursue their careers. Nick's passion for politics was

recognised as he worked with both State and Federal MPs before joining the office of the NSW Attorney-General Gabrielle Upton as Policy Adviser. Typically, Nick had also joined the Coogee Surf Club and Dulwich Hill Bicycle Club.

Tragically, Nicholas was struck by a car and killed while cycling with a group of riders from the Bicycle Club in Maroubra on 9 December, 2015 aged 25 years. Nick and Verity had recently announced their engagement.

A service at the Coogee Bay Hotel celebrating Nick's life was attended by 400 mourners including the NSW Attorney-General and the Premier Mike Baird. Nick is survived by his mother Jackie and sister Madison, who spoke of his strength following the death of their father Michael, little more than a year ago.
























