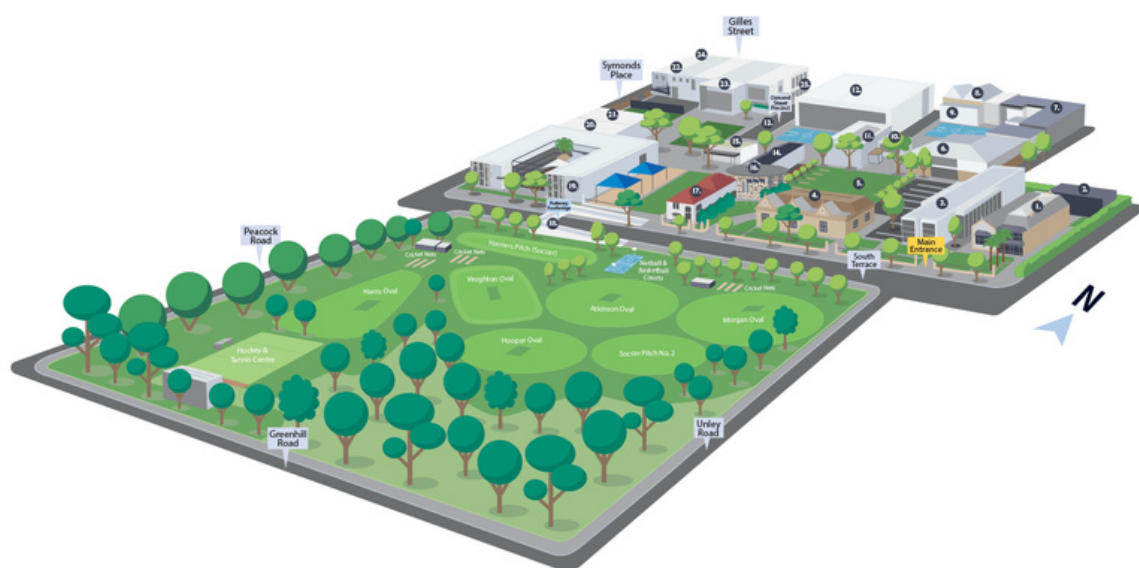

Requirements for international students Satisfactory Course Progress

It is a requirement for students on a student visa to maintain satisfactory course progress. To demonstrate satisfactory course progress, students will need to achieve a C standard in all courses in any study period. If a student does not achieve a minimum C standard in any course in a study period, the School will formally contact the parent(s) to advise there will be a meeting with the student to develop an intervention strategy for academic improvement. If the student does not improve sufficiently academically and achieve satisfactory course progress by the end of the next study period, Pulteney Grammar School will advise the student in writing of its intention to report the student for breach of visa condition.



Learning Management System

Pulteney uses Canvas, a Learning Management System (LMS), to support our secondary students, across Year 7 to Year 12 as we further our vision for high quality, personalised and continuous online feedback for students.

Parents can use the mobile app to view upcoming deadlines on the calendar, notifications, tasks, and grade results. The website provides greater functionality and access to teacher feedback on the tasks and learning.

English as an Additional Language (EAL) support

Students whose English is their additional language are supported by specialist teachers in small groups and classes. Pathways are available for students to study EAL as a literacy subject to fulfil the literacy requirement in middle and senior schools.

Requirements for international students

Attendance

International students studying with a student visa (subclass 500) are obligated to attend at least 80% of their scheduled classes, as required by their visa. In cases of non-compliance with this attendance requirement, the Department of Home Affairs may be informed.

Absence

International students need to notify the school of an absence.

Reasons for absence must be verified with supporting evidence, such as medical certificates. Any unverified absence will be recorded as an unexplained absence.

Uniform

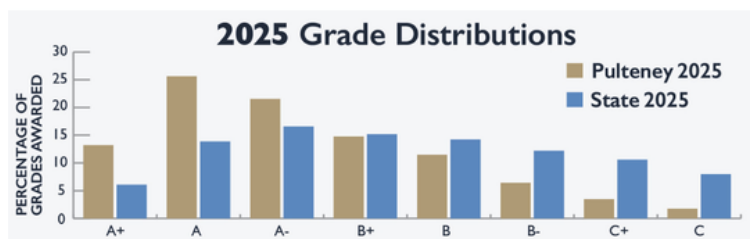
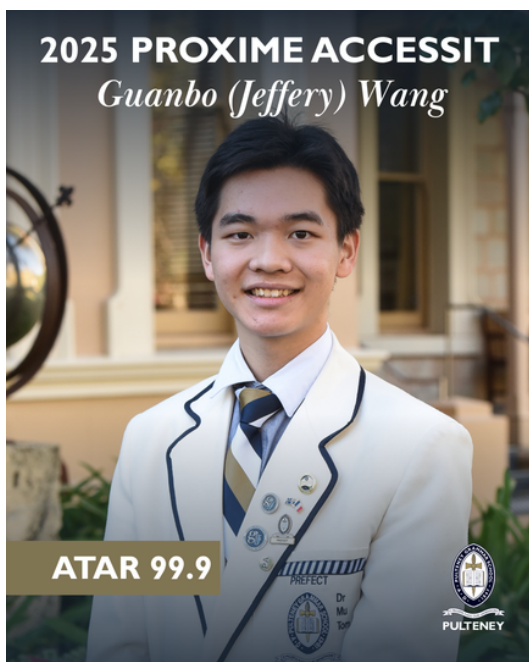
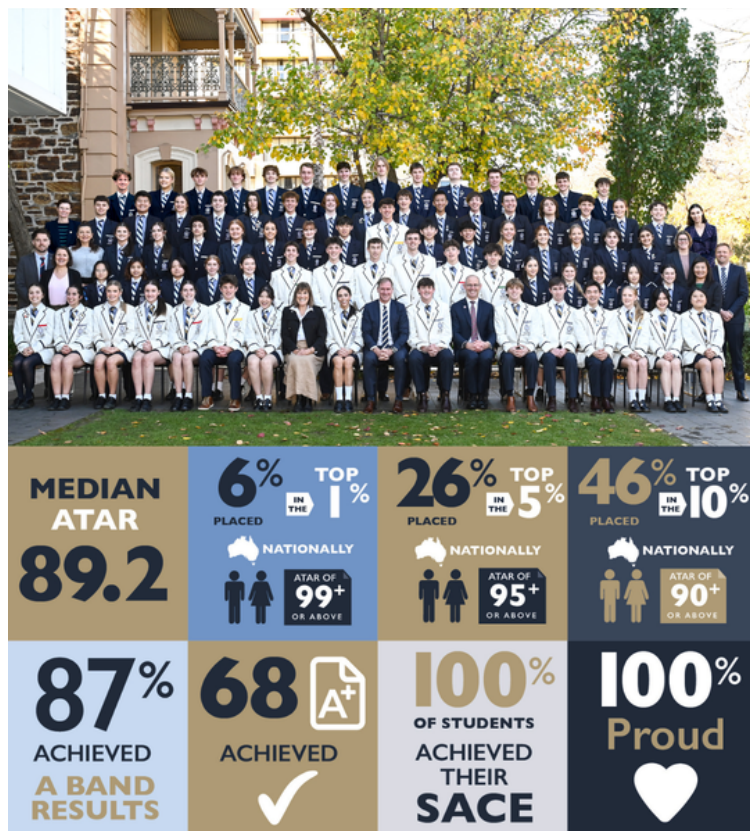
International Trips

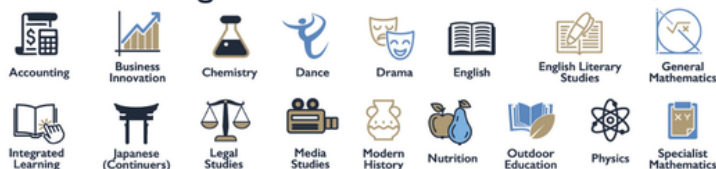

Requirements for International Students

Criteria for enrolment

Applications from International Students are assessed and considered on the basis of:

- the number of positions available at the appropriate year level.
- the resources of the School.
- the student's academic records and English language proficiency level for the proposed course of study.
- English language proficiency is determined by the result of a test undertaken by an approved English Language Assessment organisation.
- Students must reside with one or both parents, a suitable relative, or a school-approved homestay for the duration of their visa.

English Proficiency

International students require an adequate command of English so that they can manage the work in mainstream classes.

A condition of enrolment is that a student undertakes a formal English Language Assessment upon application for admission to Pulteney. This can be carried out in their country of origin through the Australian Education Assessment Services (www.aeas.com.au) or another official English assessment organisation.

Students may be required to undertake intensive English language study prior to their entry to mainstream study. Pulteney will provide parents with details of schools able to offer this service.

Welfare and Accommodation Requirement

To maintain adequate arrangements for welfare, international students must stay in Australia with:

- parent or legal custodian; or
- a relative who has been nominated by parents; or
- a homestay that have been approved by the school. In this case, the registered provider will issue a Confirmation of Appropriate Accommodation and Welfare (CAAW) letter.

Overseas Student Health Cover

International students on a student visa (subclass 500) are required by Commonwealth Government legislation to have overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the duration of their studies in Australia. Students can arrange OSHC independently or ask the School to purchase it on their behalf. Allianz Care Australia is the preferred provider of OSHC for Pulteney Grammar School.

If the OSHC is arranged by the School, the premium must be paid in full prior to the School issuing the electronic Confirmation of Enrolment required for the visa application.

Application

Step 1 – Lodge

To begin the application process, please

-submit an online form at

<https://www.pulteney.sa.edu.au/enrolment-and-applications/> and an AUD 150.00 non-refundable application fee online; or

-download the International Student Application for Admission form from

<https://www.pulteney.sa.edu.au/international-students/> and submit all required documents to international.enrolments@pulteney.sa.edu.au. Once the application form is received, an invoice will be issued for an AUD 150.00 non-refundable application fee.

Step 2 – Assess

Upon receipt of the application fee, Pulteney will assess the application, including evaluation of reports and of English language proficiency.

The applicant will be interviewed by the Head of School and the Principal will make the final decision on the acceptance of students to the School.

Step 3 – Enrol

The enrolment process will commence with a Letter of Offer of place made in writing and this will be accompanied by a Fee Invoice.

Acceptance of Enrolment is made by completion of the relevant forms and payment of the Enrolment Confirmation Fee, a deposit equivalent to one-half year's tuition and fees plus a AUD 1,250.00 enrolment fee.

Upon receipt of the Acceptance of Enrolment form and the monies, an electronic Confirmation of Enrolment certificate (eCoE) will be issued for the application for a student visa (subclass 500).
